

STEERING GEAR LUBRICATION

As a suggestion, the next time you service your steering gear, fill the box with as much chassis lube as you can pump into it. Then fill in the voids with all the EP-140 gear lubricant that it will hold. Then turn the steering gear from stop to stop and then add EP-140 to the top once again.

You see, all steering gears are prone to leak with normal use. By using chassis lube you will provide a non-leaking medium that will tend to seal the leakage area while the EP-





140 will provide the extreme pressure lubrication for severe metal to metal lubrication.

In other words, the grease will keep the lubricating oil on the job.

In the 1930s, the major trends for hairstyles were all about waves. With a softer look than the sleek bob and tight ringlets of the 1920s, women began wearing their hair in more feminine styles with parts sweeping to the side or down the middle. At the beginning of the decade, short hair still reigned for men's hairstyles as well as for women's

But as the 1930s marched on, women started opting for longer hair. Lengths would reach to the shoulder with some choosing to pin their hair underneath. Bangs also took the spotlight as women wore short fringe in front. I absolutely love these retro hairdos, and I hope you do!

The wavy hairstyles of the 1930s live on today, although many women wear their hair in less defined waves compared to decades past. In fact, even for guys, many of today's modern hairstyles and haircuts for men are based on old-fashion trends and styles that have just been updated and brought back into the mainstream. Films like "The Aviator" and "Water for Elephants" also showcased curly coifs of the decade. In modern times, finger waves are often only seen at formal events and on the red carpet.







Men of the business and social world were most often clean shaven, wore parted, short hair, often slicked down with pomade. Sideburns were usually short. Mustaches were small and less frequently seen. Hats were worn during Formal events, with business suits, and sporting activities, but removed when indoors.

Children's hair was often a copy of adults but usually a softer, more informal version.

Even before 1927, women had entered the working world, speakeasy's and rumble seats. Many women cut their "Crowning glory" into short "Bob's" (hair worn short and close to the head). First seen as straight with bangs, it evolved to softer waved styles. They were achieved with a heated "Marcel iron", pin curls or a finger wave. Machine waves were also becoming popular (if you had an entire day to spend in the beauty salon) as they allowed the styles to last between washings.

Cheekbones were usually softened by "Dips" (waves), or curls. Longer hair was controlled at the nape of the neck in one or more soft rolls, a loose knot or a cluster of curls. Although loose hair was allowed on young girls, women were considered 'cheap' if they wore their hair this way.

The above chart is for dealers' information in identifying the various sizes of glass used in Model A cars and trucks. All of this glass is ground and cut to exact Model A requirements and can be obtained promptly from Ford branches.
